in 1807. A waterwheel powered by spring water turned massive burrstones used to process grain into flour and feed grown on local farms. Grim resided in the brick home at the northwest corner of Mickley Road. Reuben Helfrich purchased the mill in 1872 since then named Helfrich Springs Grist Mill. Milling ceased about 1930.

### May 28, 2025 – "Fries Rebellion" Film – Jay Searock – 7 PM

It was in the late 1790's when a group of local citizens from Northampton (and currently Lehigh), eastern Berks, upper Bucks, and upper Mongomery counties protested against a new Federal Tax,

enforced by the administration under the jurisdiction of President John Adams. The leader of this insurgence was a Pennsylvania auctioneer named John Fries (pronounced 'freeze') who organized meetings to discuss communal reaction to the tax. This tax was imposed upon all home, land



and slave owners. The assessors were shown no mercy and several were sent fleeing. Many arrests were made.

This 32-minute, professionally produced docudrama is sure to entertain and educate an audience of all ages. Written by Sarajane Williams, president of the Lower Macungie Township Historical Society, the film commemorates the upcoming 250th Anniversary of the United States and will become a legacy for generations to come. Scenes in the film feature original sites still in existence. Jay Searock, who will be presenting the film, portrays John Fries. You won't want to miss it.

# June 25, 2025—Speaker Presentation—Our Changing Landscape: 19th Century Industry and Transformation—Martha Capwell Fox—7 PM



CHANGE....Some of us embrace it, for others, it may not be as easy to accept. Theodore Roosevelt said "There can be no life without change, and to be afraid of what is different or unfamiliar is to be afraid of life." For those of us who have lived in the Lehigh

Valley all our existence, we

have experienced many changes to our surroundings. The alterations to the Lehigh Valley landscape started in the 19<sup>th</sup> century when farmland was transformed into an industrialized region later becoming the backbone of the American Industrial Revolution. Learn how this historical imprint continues to shape our terrain.



Martha Capwell Fox, archivist and historian for the D&L National Heritage Corridor and author of several historical related books, will discuss the many factors how this area of Eastern Pennsylvania was responsible for the growth of America as we know it today, focusing on the contributions Whitehall Township has rendered.

## July, 26, 2025—Civil War Encampment—153<sup>rd</sup> Regiment PA Volunteer Infantry—10 AM to 4 PM

The 993 men of the 153<sup>rd</sup> Regiment were enlisted into service in September 1862. This noble organization consisted primarily of young men whose trade was farming and many others who were mechanics and professionals. A numerous amount of these soldiers were relatives of the patriots of the Revolution. The 153<sup>rd</sup> was chiefly composed of men from Northampton County.





This volunteer Regiment had partaken in several Campaigns and two major battles, that of Chancellorsville and Gettysburg. Their call to duty ended in July of 1863 with a total of 89 fatalities: 69 enlisted—killed or mortally wounded and 20 by disease and accidents. A fellow comrade of the 153rd, Rev. William. R. Kiefer said, "No part of the army engaged in the Nation's defense deserves more of the commendation of their countrymen and to hold a warmer place

in the memory of the future generations, than our own Northampton County Regiment".

The reenactors of this honorable troop are among that "future generation" dedicated to preserving the memories and experiences that these men of the 153<sup>rd</sup> Regiment PA Volunteer Infantry had to endure. Perhaps you could be a descendant of one of these brave men. Learn their stories. Location of the encampment is on the grounds of the Peter Grim Homestead (506 Mickley Rd. Whitehall).

The Helfrich Springs Grist Mill and Peter Grim House will be open for tours as well.

### 2025 OPEN Mill, Museum and House Schedule

tell us how frequently they pass this beautiful stone structure curious to know what the interior looks like. This historic landmark was built over 200 years ago. The two-story red brick house across the street was established in 1834 and is also available for tours. We offer several opportunities for anyone to come inside.
